


Bev: Have you always been interested in YA literature?

Katie: It all started with *The Giver* by Lois Lowry. One of my kids was reading it for school and said that it was the best book they'd ever read, so I read it. It made me remember that sensation of falling into a book so completely that I hadn't really experienced since I was a



teenager. The fourth book in the series, Son, was just released this fall. It's fantastic!

Bev: And then...?

Katie: And then came *The Hunger Games* and I was hopelessly hooked! The thing about YA books is that teenagers have a low tolerance for boredom, so the book has to grab you within the first two pages or teenagers won't keep reading. Actually, adults like that, too. YA books tend to be fast paced and emotional and full of twists and turns that surprise and delight till the last sentence.

Bev: Who are some of your favorite YA authors?

Katie: Maggie Stiefvater, whose most recent book is *The Raven Boys*, is a fantastic writer! Her use of language is lovely and interesting, with unique characters that somehow really resonate with today's world. I also love anything by Lauren Oliver, especially *Before I Fall*, in which a teenage girl has to relive a single day over and over,



each time learning something important and becoming a better person.

Bev: Why do you think more adults don't try YA literature? Is it not serious enough?

Katie: I'm not sure, but some of it is very serious. The current trend seems to be to use a dystopian post-apocolyptic world with varying levels of governmental control to explore ideas related to current society. Of course, in the end, human kindness and courage and beauty tend to win out, themes that young adults and old adults can both appreciate.




Dog Diaries #1: Ginger by Kate Klimo






