The Unfinished Life of Addison Brown by Adele Griffin

In this novel, Adele Griffin gives a unique perspective about a talented, young artist's entire life through "interviews" of all her close friends, family and even enemies. Even though I found this in the fiction section, as I was reading I was convinced it had to be based on a true story. Griffin includes author's notes about the problems she faced while collecting the information for this book and pictures of the artist and her artwork, Addison Stone, and her friends and family. Usually, I like imagining myself what the characters in books look like, but by having actual pictures of them, it made it all seem more real. I actually felt like I knew Addison and really understood her complicated personality. I found myself biting my nails and literally sitting on the edge of my seat several times due to the anxiety, happiness, and even frustration I actually felt towards the characters while reading this novel. Painted Horses by Malcolm Brooks

Malcolm Brooks, in his debut novel, *Painted Horses*, shares a fine story of a young, female archeologist sent to Montana to record an ancient past soon doomed to flooding by a major dam project. Set in 1950's at a time of change and prosperity, this vanishing way of life clashes with the new, all in the name of progress. The characters and events shape a believable metaphor for a time that will never come again despite desperate efforts to keep it alive.

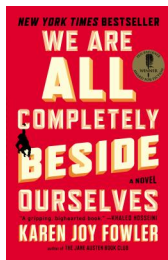
Brooks brings a new perspective to the idea of a vanishing past through his indelible descriptions. We meet tough minded individualists seeking safety from their pasts in a landscape that can swallow them, or save them. Horses become a moral core of the story, and I don't think I've read another book that describes their rightful place with as much heart.

The advice, "write what you know" comes to mind as I think about this book, because Malcolm Brooks's passion for the West comes through on every page. That was the best part. It took me there.
